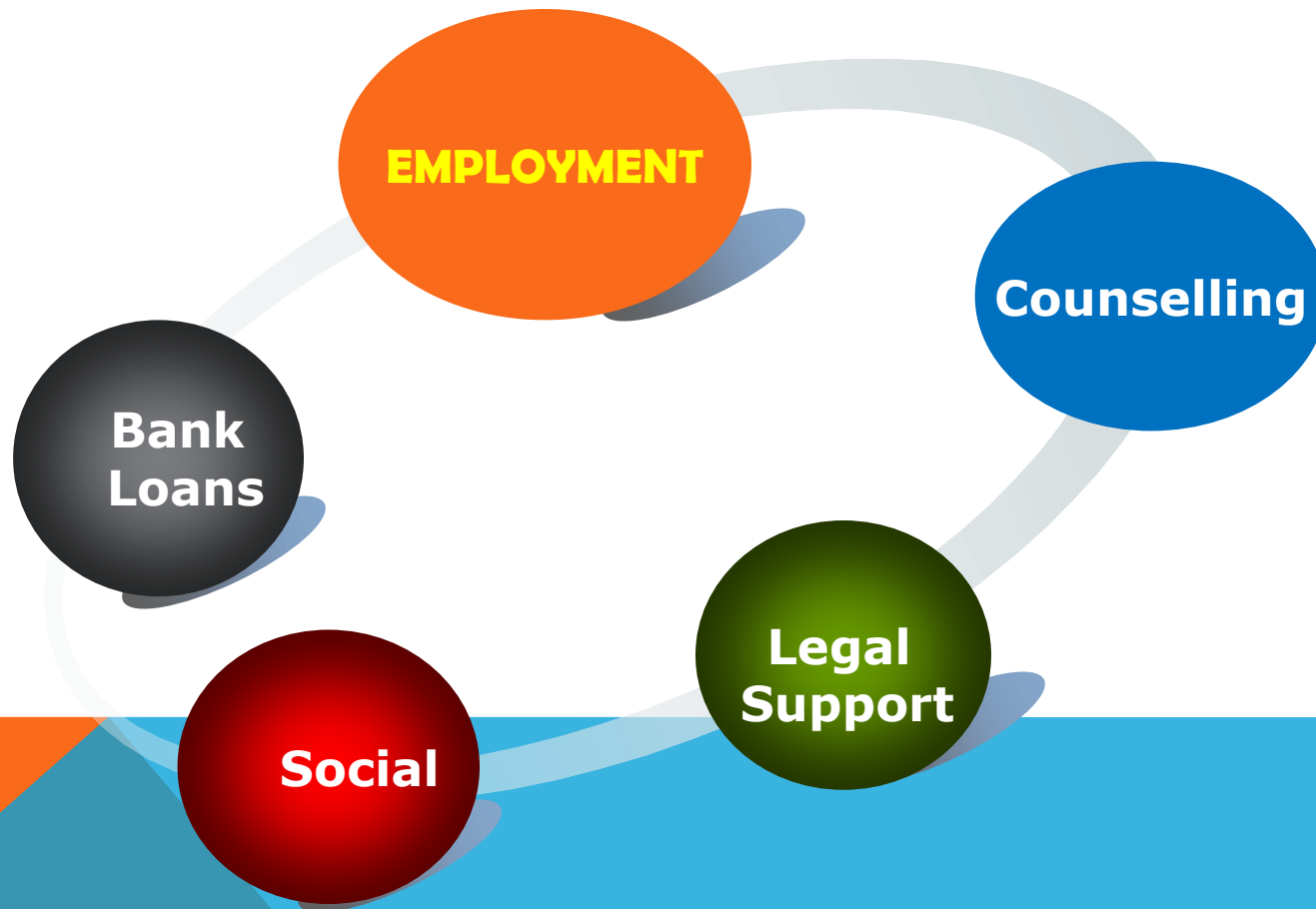

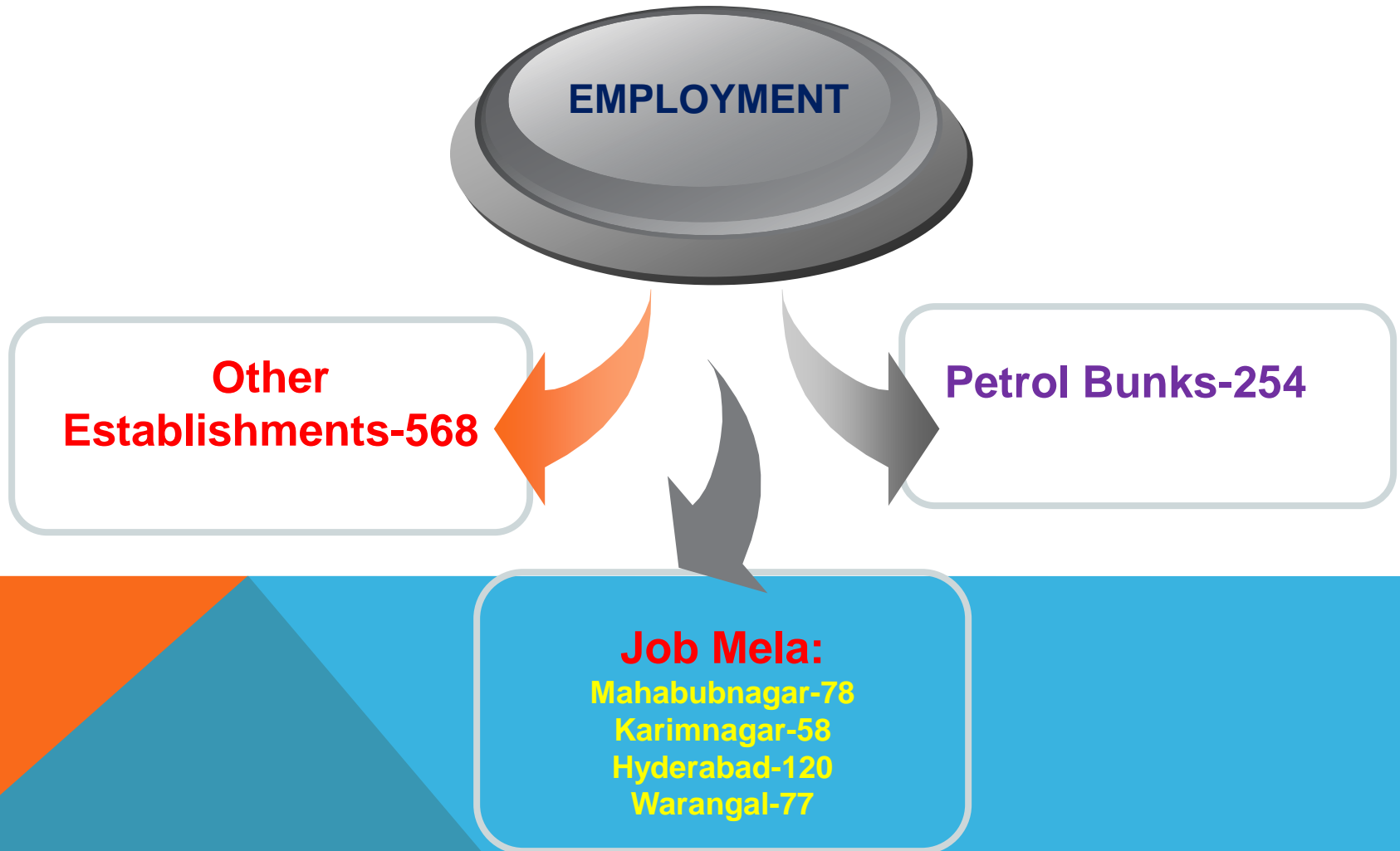

## OTHER STORIES 200 FORMER PRISONERS GET JOBS

As many as 200 ex-prisoners, who did graduation while serving time in jails, secured placement in various private companies during a job mela held by the Warangal Central Prison authorities here on Monday.

Inspector General, Jails department, A. Narasimha told the ex-prisoners that getting a job was a great opportunity for them to correct themselves and urged them to choose the righteous path to prove their worth to their families. "There are several misconceptions surrounding a former prisoner in the society and this has a negative impact on their mindset and hinders their efforts to lead a normal life," he said.

"The state government has taken several initiatives for the welfare of the ex-prisoners. Now, it is time for them to prove their worth in the society," he said.

Mr Narasimha said three such job melas were held at jails in the state earlier. Over 222 ex-prisoner found placement in Hyderabad, 147 in Mahbubnagar and 43 in Karimnagar. Similar job melas would be held across the state every three months, he said.

He said that through various businesses, the jails department is having a turnover of ₹500 crore and is also earning a profit of ₹20 crore.

Warangal city police chief V. Ravinder said the department would keep an eye on the ex-prisoners' conduct in their new role.

Karimnagar: Director General of Prison department VK Singh has said that social reforms would help in creation of employment and reduction of crimes in the society. He along with commissioner of police VB Kamalasan Reddy attended the job mela programme at district jail for the released prisoners here on Tuesday. He said that the training programme has been conducted to help the prisoners transform. Jail superintendent D Dasharatha Ram Reddy told media persons that of 80 prisoners released, 50 have been selected for various companies as per their qualifications.

## Ex-convicts get a new chance at life

200 former prisoners get placement at special job mela in Warangal

In a goodwill gesture, the State government conducted a special job mela for former prisoners at Central Prison here on Monday.

As many as 200 ex-convicts, who had the requisite educational qualifications, were given placement orders by various private companies under the aegis of jails department. Many of them had enrolled for educational courses during their jail term.

**‘Redeem yourselves’**  
IG (Jails) A. Narasimha, addressing the ex-prisoners at the job mela, said it was a great opportunity for them to redeem themselves and prove useful to their families and society.

“There are misconcep-

tions that a former prisoner is worthless and will not get any job. Now the State go-

vernment has come up with special initiatives to help them and it is time for them

to prove themselves,” he pointed out.

Mr. Narasimha said this was the third job mela to be held in a jail in the State and henceforth, special job melas would be conducted at jails every three months to help released prisoners for good conduct.

Speaking at the job mela, city police commissioner V. Ravinder said, “The department will keep a watch on you and how you conduct yourself in your new role. If you right yourself, you will get many more chances.”

District Legal Services Authority secretary Annie Rose Christian congratulated the ex-convicts who got placement orders.

“It is a rare opportunity and now it is time to prove yourself to the society,” she said.

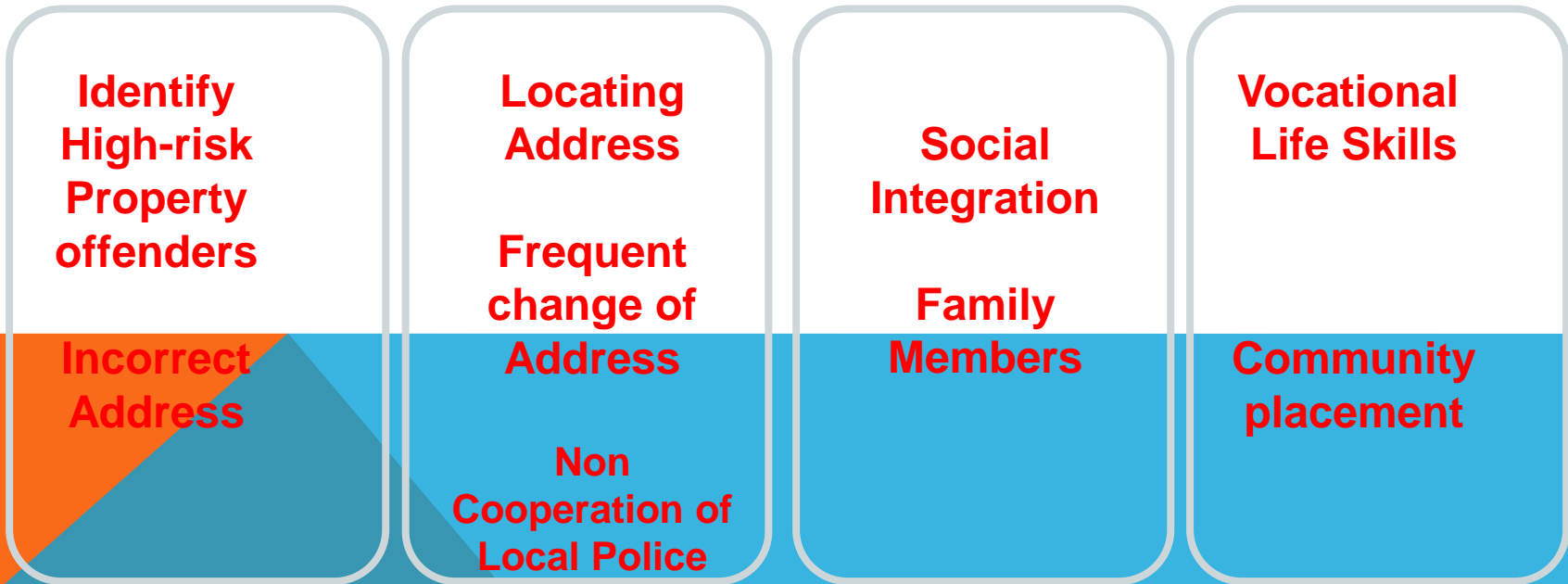
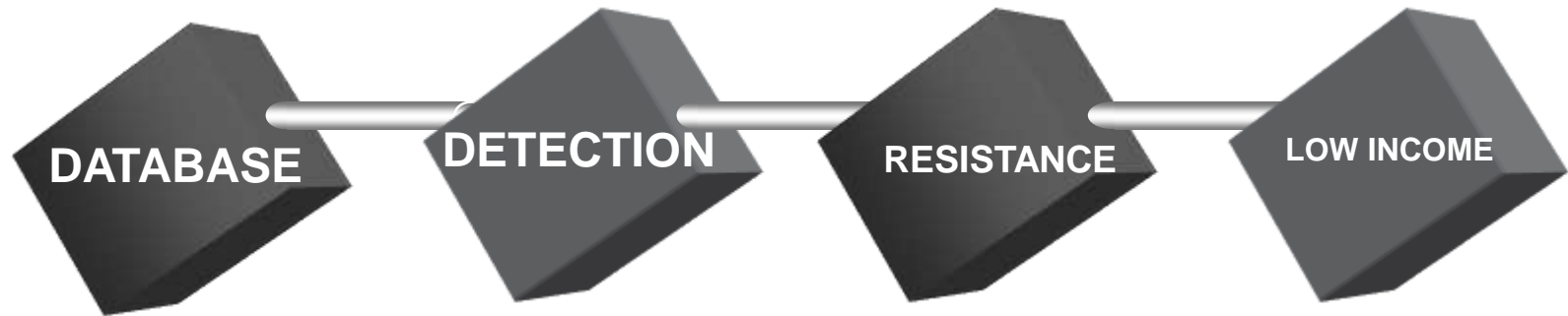
